Intrinsic Problems of Love, Power, and Justice

- Ontology- the root meaning
- "Love" sometimes feels like an emotional state- something that cannot be defined.
- Is love nothing more than a feeling?
- Another understanding of love is not emotional but ethical. Judaic-Christian tradition combines love with ethical duties.
- But we sense that love, if demanded, produces indifference or even, hostility.



Intrinsic Problems of Love, Power, and Justice, cont.

- What are the qualities of love?
 - 1. Eros (sensual)
 - 2. Agape (spiritual)
 - 3. Self-love
 - 4. Brotherly love (philos)







Intrinsic Problems of Love, Power, and Justice, cont.

- What is the meaning of "power"?
- There is no politics which is without power.
- However, the term 'power-politics' denotes an element of force or compulsion.
- We instinctively know there is an element of compulsion which occurs whenever we encounter power.
- If we limit our understanding of "power" to compulsion we have removed justice and love.

Intrinsic Problems of Love, Power, and Justice, cont.

Paul Tillich asks: "How does spiritual power work, how is it related to physical and psychological power and how is it related to the compulsory element of power?"

Relational Problems of Love, Power, and Justice

- Examining "justice"
- If love is understood as an emotion and power understood as a means of force, then it is difficult to connect them in a constructive way.
- It is commonly understood that love adds something to justice.
- Is leniency always loving?
- Justice is just because of the love which is implicit in it.

Relational Problems of Love, Power, and Justice, cont.

- Law is the basic manifestation of power.
- Tillich suggests there are two possible theories behind establishment of law:
 - 1. Military or economic force
 - Natural or rational principles



Law



Where Does Our Law Come From?

- Some may argue over whether law is something imposed by governments, agreed upon by society, discovered through natural moral principals, or accepted as divinely inspired.
- It is probably true to say that our various laws are, to a greater or lesser degree, a product of all of these.
- Law evolved from "natural law" as societies became more sophisticated.

The Anglo-American Legal System

- Can be traced back to William the Conqueror (1066 AD)
- Public law v. Private law

Sources of Law:

- Constitutions
- Statutes
- Administrative rules and regulations
- Court decisions
- Executive orders
- Treaties

Constitutions

The U.S. Constitution is the supreme law of the land.



Statutes

 Laws are passed by the U.S. Congress, or any state legislature.



Administrative Rules and Regulations

 Rules and regulations are adopted by federal or state administrative agencies such as the IRS, EPA, or state health department.




Court Decisions

The doctrine of stare decisis requires courts to consider past rulings, and to follow decisions of higher courts.



Structure of the Court System



Federal Courts


- U.S. District Courts trial level courts Exclusive jurisdiction to hear:
 - Federal anti-trust cases
 - Admiralty (maritime disputes)
 - Bankruptcy
 - Employee RetirementIncome Security Act




Federal Courts, cont.

- U.S. District Courts
 Concurrent (shared) jurisdiction with state courts to hear:
 - Disputes arising under Constitutional or federal law
 - Disputes between citizens of different states (if over \$75,000)

Alternative Dispute Resolution

- Arbitration 3rd party decision which is binding
- Mediation 3rd party attempts to bring about an agreed resolution



A Brief History of Medicine

 Mysticism and bloodletting to germ theory, surgery, MRIs, etc. in 150 years





A Brief History of Medicine, cont.

- Louis Pasteur (1822-1895)
- Joseph Lister (1827-1912)
- Paul Starr (The Social Transformation of American Medicine)
- "Few institutions have undergone as radical a metamorphosis as have hospitals in their modern history..."

Civil War to World War I

- Training for physicians changed from a few months after high school to 3 or more years, and programs placed more emphasis on science and research.
- The AMA proposed new standards for medical schools.
- Around 1920, the American College of Surgeons developed minimum standards for hospitals and began on-site inspections.

Birth of Health Policy and Politics

- Around the turn of the century hospitals became more complex with specialized staff.
- American College of Hospital Administration
 –now the American College of Healthcare
 Executives (ACHE) founded 1933
